

The Kinsella Kids

This is a mixed series of cards of which some are familiar through their frequency and other sets are very rare. Most of us will have seen the cricket set and the tennis set is seen nearly as often. However I felt it was useful to list all the sets so that when the odd one may come your way you can see where it may fit in your collection. All the sets were printed by Messrs Langsdorff Co. in London and the first set – the cricketer – was published in 1906. Each set has a number indicating most probably the sequence of printing.

There was an interesting article on these cards in Picture Postcard Monthly by Mr. Alf Harper but I have no date on my photocopy though it must be at least 10 years ago and he omitted completely the golf set and the fishing series probably because of their relative rarity.



Blyth South Australia

Blyth War Memorial, South Australia

Blyth War memorial dedicated to the men who served in the wars from Blyth districts including Kybunga and Hart. The war memorial committee had been given approval for an allotment inside the fence of Railway Reserve opposite the main street. A public meeting was to be held for selection of the design of the memorial to the soldiers in 1922. Owing to the fact that the public meeting was held but as not many residents showed up, the committee

was to decide as to what the Soldiers War Memorial should be.

The Soldiers War Memorial was constructed by Tillett in Adelaide, for Blyth at the cost of £405. Through fetes and donations the money was raised for the construction of the Soldiers War Memorial at Blyth.

The day came when the Blyth and Districts Soldiers War Memorial was unveiled.


On Sunday 4th of May 1925, a large crowd gathered to hear and view Col.C.P. Butler D.S.O. The opening was preceded by the well-known hymn by Dr. Watts, "O' God our help in ages past" which was sung from the heart by all. With many cheers and happiness for the memorial to the fathers, sons and husbands who served in the Great War to end all wars.


Leslie Thomas, my great grandfather is named on this Memorial. He enlisted 3rd August 1916 and returned 12 July 1919. Leslie died in 1964.






Many of these cards are postally used with the last (viz. cycling) being mainly used in 1909

ANZAC Sons

With reference to over 500 letters and postcards

Anzac sons: The story of five brothers in the war to end all wars / Allison Marlow Paterson.

Anzac Sons is composed from a collection of over five hundred letters and postcards written by the brothers who served. From the training grounds of Victoria, Egypt


and England, to the Western Front battlefields - Pozieres, Bullecourt, Messines, Menin Road, Passchendaele, Villers-Bretonneux and the village battles of 1918 – this compelling true story was compiled by the granddaughter of a surviving brother. She takes us on her journey as she walks in the footsteps of her ancestors. This is a story of mateship, bravery and sacrifice; it is a heartbreaking account of a family torn apart by war. It is a pledge to never forget.

Well dear Jim it breaks my heart to write this letter. Our dear [brother] was killed yesterday morning at 5.30. The bullet killed him instantly and he never spoke a word. I had just left him and gone down the trench to see the other lads when I was called back. Oh Jim it is awful'Oh I do hope he is the last...

It is April 27, 1919.

two Melbourne Architects

were chosen. The foundation

The architects Phillip and James based the Shrine in a classical style, being that on the Tomb of Mausolus at




THE BUILD NO CONTROL OF THE PARTY OF THE PAR


THE NATIONAL WAS INEMOSSIAL OF VICTORIA.

The Shrine of Remembrance, Melbourne, Victoria. The Memorial dedicated all the men and women of Victoria who served in World War 1. And now to all Australians who have served in wars. One of the largest war memorials in Australia, and is the site of annual observances of ANZAC Day and Remembrance Day.

Melbourne population proposed a war memorial soon as the war had ended in November 1918. During 1920 the Victorian Government appointed the War Memorials Advisory Committee, chaired by Sir Baldwin Spencer. August 1921 an executive committee was formed, included the former commander of the Australian forces in the

THE PICTURE POSTCARD. The following resume of the postcard trade comes from Belgium :- "A French pournal estimates the number of eards annually nut for sale in France at a million. Of these about three-quarters are views of towns and villages, while one-quarter are purely 'fiction' eards, i.e., artistic, fantastic, or humorous imaginations. Germany, the home of the picture postcard, does most in the view line; while in Munich alone, of late years, the fontastic sort is being printed. England, hypnetised by the Boer War, is satisfied with military or patriotic cards. In Italy the cards are mostly of political interest, and a recent series of Italian 'types and studies' are a pleasant relief from the rows of statesmen and soldiers. Spain's cards are copies of its great works in sculpture or poetry."


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The Australian War Memorial by Glen Northcott







A memorial for Australia was conceived by Charles Bean. During his time with the Australians of the 1st AIF (Australian Imperial Force) while at Gallipoli as their war correspondent. Throughout the fighting and bloodshed of Gallipoli, the 1st AIF were sent to the greater horrors of the Western Front in France and Belgium. During the fierce fighting and battles, the suffering of the men appalled Charles Bean. During his time

on the Western Front, Charles Bean was so concerened about the way the world was treating its men that he quite regularly talked about creating a museum.


Two men founded what is today one of the most greatest monuments of the world, these great men were


