booklet was meant as a gift and the first page is designed to record "From' and 'To'. On the rear cover is the following notation: 'Manufactured by C.O. Petersen, Melbourne, Australia, for the V.S.M., Melbourne, and O.S.& P.C.Co., Sydney'.

The 'Our Animals' Booklet also contains 7 pages and the coloured illustrations are headed 'Australian Fauna', together with the name of the animal (common and scientific) and each is signed H. Praetorius. Below each illustration is a verse. Details of the reat cover as above, (note: the great Kangaroo is missing from the State Library Collection)

The third booklet, 'Bush Life', follows

the same format as the other two however as well as a H. Praetorius signature, the illustrations are date '07'. Each illustration is given added life by the verse beneath it, specially those featuring the works of A.B. Paterson. For instance, the verse on 'Colonial Experience' reads:

'He was always his mother's idiot, since ever his father died;

And there sint'a a horse on the station that he isn't game to ride!'

A.B. Paterson

Praetorius was also involved in another publication providing the illustrations for a nature story book for young children, entitle



"Tommy's ride on the emu' by J.A. Fletcher which was published around 1922 by Whitcombe & Tombs. The small book of 32 pages contains nine black/white illustrations by Hans G. Praetorius.


While some of this artistic output is in the public domains, there is little information available about Praetorius himself. What is know is that he arrived in Melbourne aboard the S.S. Somersetshire on 21 February 1879 as a young man of 21. He was born in Buckenbung in the Principality of

cards particularly collectable.

There are six cards in the Australia Life series: Hunting The Kangaroo; A Tragedy of the Drought; Colonial Experience; Bail-Up; A Danger of the Bush and Yarding Cattle.

The State Library of Victoria has five of the Australian Life postcards in its collection (not Yarding Cattle) all of which were published by the Victorian Stamp Market Melbourne (V.S.M.).

It was not unusual for Australian fauna to feature on postcards in the early 1900's and several artists contributed to this theme. However, in my opinion it is the images of Australian birds and animals by Praetorius in his fauns series



that are particularly fine. The postcards of birds are:
Lyrebird; Black Swan; Love
Bird; Sulphur Crested
Cockatoo; Emu and
Laughing Jackass. While the animals are: Tasmanian Wolf;
Dingo; Wombat, Ringtail
Opossum, Native bear and the Great Kangaroo. For each postcard the common name of the animals or bird is given and is followed, in

brackets, with the scientific name.

The State Library has tow of the bird postcard (Lyrebird and Love Bird) and both were published by the Ocean Stamp & Postcard Co (Sydney) (O.S.& P.C. Co.).

It would appear that both series of postcards were published by the V.S.M. and O.S.& P.C.Co.

The inspiration for the Australian Fauna and the Australian Life series postcards were the illustrations found in three small booklets by Praetorius which were published in 1907 by the Melbourne company. C.O. Petersen. The booklets are: A Greeting From Sunny Australia: Our Birds, A Greeting From Sunny Australia: Bush Life. The 'Our Birds' booklet has 7 paged (19x24cm) six coloured illustrations, inset on the page with a floral border. Each illustration is headed 'Australian Fauna' together with the name of the bird (common and scientific) and are signed H. Praetorius, other than the Lyre Bird which is signed Praetorius. Beneath each illustration is a verse, appropriate to the illustration. The

SOLDIER TO WED HIS BOY, HOOD'S SWEETHEART MILLIONAIRE LOSES ' 'VICTORY FOR FIRST . LOVE.' ?

No more picturesque romance of .the war has been revealed than that which will have a fitting climax at the end of the present month (says a recent Glasgow -V Weekly Record'), when Gunner T. H. Arrowsmiih,, Australian Field Artillery, will be;marriediat'-St. Margaret's, -Westminster, to Miss Amice Kathleen Asperrie Deane, stepdaughter' :of Surgeon-Major Robert Graves Burton, of Ealing.

Mr. Hughes, the Australian Prime Minister, has promised to be present, together with Mr. Fisher, the High Commissioner, arid the guard of honor will include V.C.'s, and D.C.M.'s. Gunner Arrowsmith came over with the first Australian contingent, and survived many fierce engagements during the campaign on the Gallipoli Peninsula. He has several scars from severe wounds. His father was also wounded in the same campaign. I

n an interview, speaking of his prospective bride, he said: 'We went to school together. She used to help nio with my English, and I to assist her with her French. We grew very fond of one another, in a boy and girl manner. Eight years &30 I went to Australia, and for a time we corresponded, but it gradually waned, till we never wrote at all. Nevertheless I never forgot her.

When the war broke out I joined the Australian contingent and I sent her a postcard to say that I was going to fight. In view of that I asked her if she would send me a letter. She did so, and letters became more frequent,, but I had no idea of what was waiting for me when I arrived at Paddington recently. There she was with her parents, and directly she saw me — well, perhaps I had not better say any more.'

Incidentally, he mentioned that Miss Deane was formerly engaged to be married to a well known millionaire, describing the incident as a 'victory for first love'.'

The event has roused keen interest at the headquarters' of the Australian Contingent, Millbank, where Arrowsmith is very popular. Surgeon-Major Burton has himself seen, much 'active service, having served in the 77th Regiment and 6th Innisiliing Dragoons. Boy, this vintage postcard message missed its intended purpose by a mile. I certainly wouldn't be threatened by the possibility that Santa Claus would "take me along". I'd probably be bad on purpose. Can you imagine riding in Santa Claus' sleigh? Or seeing his reindeer?

The other thing I noticed in this postcard message was Tillie used "Postal Card" rather than postcard. Maybe that was the accepted name for this



type ephemera back then.

Artistic Postcards by Hans Praetourius

Of the many cigarette car sets produced by Sniders & Abrahams, my favourite is the series of 'Animals and Birds; because of my interest in Australian fauna and for the realism of the artwork.. There are 60 cards in the set and the images are reproduced from watercolours done by the Melbourne artist Hans Praetorius for the Melbourne printing company, Osboldstone & Co. The watercolours were commissioner for the purpose of being published on cigarette cards. The watercolours (and cards) are signed Prae.

Praetorius was also responsible for the illustrations on the 'Animals' set of Sniders & Abrahams cards. Again the original artwork was commission by Osboldstone & Co. Both sets of cigarette cards are quality art in miniature.

The illustrations on the Sniders & Abrahams cigarette cards are only one dimension of Praetorius' artistic output. While he was one of the lesser know postcard artist, he was nevertheless talented and several of his paintings were reproduced as attractive postcards around 1908.

One postcard series was based on life in outback Australia and the other, on Australian fauna. The distinctly Australian content of both sets makes the

produced "Aloft", the story of Captain Taylor Penfold. It was produced as a 2 hour musical which debuted at the Parramatta Riverside Theatre. In an

email, she states: "As far as I know, the Captain was a title he gave to himself - a theatrical touch for his stage name. Even his son, in an article I read, didn't know how or why his father chose the name Captain Penfold".

Prince Alfred Sailors Home

The Duke of Edinburgh, Prince Alfred laid the foundation stone for this fine building of 62 rooms on his second voyage to South Australian shores aboard HMS Galatea in February 1869.

Officially opened in January 1875, the Prince Alfred Sailors home on St Vincent Street (east of Railway Station on Baker Street corner) was built to provide lodgings for visiting seamen in the days of sail, but was unfortunately demolished in 1932.


This postcard is #33 of a series published by Port Adelaide Historical Society.

His wife Sarah Elizabeth Thomas was said to have later sold her home at Portland to John Charles Addison, the then Superintendent of Prince Alfred

Sailors Home, who later married.





Fairstar the Funship By Robert Goddard (WA Topics)

Recently I opened an old shoebox full travel memorabilia, which included

the old Fairstar Cruise shop. My Ansett Airlines tick was there and a brochure on the ships services. This included the duty free shops on board where you could purchase the latest video, Hi-Fi, cassette and radio equipment using traveller's cheques and bankcard as payment methods, both now obsolete.



Little did I know that when I boarded the Fairstar in February

1996 that 12 months later the ship was to meet its doom and be cut up for scrap. I booked a 14 night cruise to New Zealand as a single passenger and via the P&O lottery system would be sharing a 4 berth cabin in steerage with 3 other single males. While I can't remember their names I do remember that between the 4 of us we had as much of Australia covered as was possible, there was Perth, Sydney, Ballarat and Darwin represented. Our cabin was no 638 on D deck at the bottom and we had 2 bunks and we got on just fine.



This was my first cruise and I had to learn how to slow down and relax. Each night we had a set table with the same dinner guests at the Palm Restaurant for the second sitting at 8.15pm. After dinner we would to so the cabaret show and eventually make it back to the cabin. On our bunks there would


be the Morning Star newspaper full of activated that would be on the following day should you manage to get out of bed.

One day for the singles there was 'cruising companions'. I filled out the form about me and my hobbies and interests and put it in the barrel. Now

gathered to see him and then parachute down, often landing among treetops, on railway lines or in the middle of Sydney Harbour. "Fear was not in his nature. He would continually risk life and limb, all for the exhilaration of being up in the region of the birds. Always the expert showman and master of self-promotion, he had his own personalised letterhead, business

cards, leaflets, flyers and posters, advertising the man who flirts with death". A typical ending to one of his exploits is shown.

"In November 1911, as part of the 50th Anniversary of Local Government in Parramatta, death defying balloonist Captain Penfold (Vincent Patrick Taylor) planned to arrive dangling



from a balloon on a trapeze, wearing full dress military uniform. The flight, like most of Captain Penfold's ballooning exploits, was doomed to an early finish: the balloon hit a tree and Penfold had to cut himself free, falling to the ground."

"Penfold had twice been rescued from San Francisco Bay: once by the USS South Dakota and once by USS West Virginian while visiting the American Atlantic Fleet. His enthusiasm for ballooning was not diminished by the



accident: he took his act overseas, and had to be rescued on a number of occasions after similar stunts, including crashing on his head while flying over London dressed as Santa Claus."

VINCENT PATRICK TAYLOR a.k.a. CAPTAIN TAYLOR PENFOLD

A postcard was sent on July 2nd 1910 from Sydney to the Minister of Defence and the contents were as follows: "Dear Sir, Kindly advise me if final time has closed, for entering a machine for the Commonwealth Aerial Prize. To oblige, truly yours, Captain Penfold, The Australian

Aeronaut, Box 1564, G.P.O." There is a blue double ringed DEFENCE ()/PM-1 16 OC 10 mark applied top centre - the delay in reception cannot be explained

The Commonwealth Government was so impressed by Blériot's feat (flight across the English Channel from Calais to Dover on 25 July 1909) that they offered a prize of £5,000 to the Australian inventor of an aeroplane suitable for military purposes. The conditions were rather onerous: it had to carry two persons and be capable of 'poising' in the air. Twenty one aviators entered but none ever claimed the prize.

Vincent Patrick Taylor (1874-1930) was a daredevil balloonist, parachutist and stuntman who astounded crowds across Sydney with his hair-raising aeronautical exploits every weekend for close to 20 years. His stunts included scaling city buildings, jumping from bridges and riding the rapids in his inflatable rubber suit.

He was best known for his balloon displays: he would go up in a hot air balloon, hang precariously from a trapeze far above the crowds that

apparently there was to be a computer involved in matched me with a suitable lady to be my cruising companion. Later in the cruise after visiting Milford Sound, Dundein and Christchurch I noticed that one of my cabin mates seemed to be missing. During the day I



didn't see him, getting dressed for dinner he wasn't around and during the night his bunk was untouched. I thought I had better make a report at the purser's office. After explain the situation the lady started to have a worried look on her face. Then she checked the computer to see if he was till spending money on board with his cruise card. She was greatly relieved and informed me

that he was alive and possibly well, as there had just been a drinks purchase on his cruise card at the sharp end bar under the bridge. We both went to check and there he was propped up against the bar as if everything was normal! The guy was a real night owl and actually stayed up all night on occasions.


When on board it wasn't too difficult to work out that the Fairstar was a very old ship. Various older passengers told me that it used to be a troop ship. Near the end of the cruise we were to fill out an evaluation form of the cruise and the ship. The cruise director told us to be aware that the ship was old and that if a major upgrade was done the cruise far would be substantially higher than what we had paid. Show did the Fairstar being its life?

In the 1950's Britain had garrisons around the world that needed transportation for replacement troops and troops finished their time at a particular location. The Bibby Line had the contract from the British Government and needed to build a new ship for this purpose. The SS Oxfordshire was built by the Fairfield Shipping & Engineering Co at Glasgow and launched on the 15/12/1955. After fitting out and sea trials the ship was ready in 1957. The Oxfordshire would complete 4 trips a year from Britain to the Far East via Port Said, Aden, and Ceylon. Troops and their families were stationed at Singapore, Malaya and Hong Kong, By the early 1960's the use of aircraft and the declining number of garrisons made the use of the Oxfordshire redundant and the British Government terminated its charter.

The Sitmar Line showed an interest in the ship for migrant program for 10 pound poms migrating to Australia. A 6yr charter agreement was signed between the Bibby Line and Fairstar Shipping Corp a subsidiary of Sitmar. The ship was then converted to a liner and cruise in May 1963 and renamed the Fairstar. In may 1964 due to cost overruns the ship was purchased outright by the Sitmar Line,. On completion and with sister ships the Fairsky and Castel Felice they migrated Britons to Australia for the rest of the 1960's In the low season the Fairstar was used for cruises to the South Pacific from Sydney. Sitmar lost the migrant contract in1970 and Fairstar was used for more cruising based at Southampton. In November 1970 Fairstar had her last line voyage from Southampton and was permantley based in Sydney in December.

The Fairstar was the only cruise ship based in Australia and through the 70's and 80's were part of many Aussie's travel plans. The largest upgrade was

completed in 1989 and then Sitmar sold the shop to P&O Cruises. In the 1990's the ship due to its age had an increasing number of breakdowns and problems that gave it a lot of bad publicity. New safety at sea requirements were to be introduced in 1997 costing large sums of money to upgrade the ship. P&O made the decision to retire the ship



and on the 21/11007 Fairstar made her final South Pacific voyage. Quielty
