Random postcard information

- A copyright on a private postal card was issued to Joh P Charlton of Philadelphia in 1861.
- The first USA government postcards in 1873.
- The first appearance of a non postal card is accredited to Austria in 1869.
- Writing by law was not allowed on the address side until March 1907.
- Pre 1898 the government only was allowed to use the word Postcard.
- Undivided back Postcard era Dec 1901 to March 1907.
- At the end of this era the picture postcard hobby became the greatest collectible hobby that the world has ever known.
- Divided back era March 1907—1915 (known as the Golden Age)
- During WWI postcards from Germany ceased and poorer quality cards from USA and the UK
 caused a crash in the hobby, the telephone started to replace the use of cards as a form of
 communication.
- White Border era 1915—1930, to save money a white border was left around the edge of a postcard, with reduced labour, higher costs and poor quality material
- Real Photo Postcard publishers enjoyed great success.
- Linen Era 1930—1945, a new American printing process allowed printing with a high rag content, the rag content also gave a textured feel to the postcard, cheaper to produce, and allowed the use of brighter colours
- During WWII, shortages and a need for military personnel forced most companies to start reprinting older views
- Photochrome Era 1939 to present day, a new type of card, the colour Photochrome appeared.
 Easily produced on high quality material and in colour. Lined and black & white postcards were replaced by 1945, Linen firms converted to Photochrome or merged with other comanes to stave off closing their businesses.

POSTCARDS from Des Beechey



This card is by Herbert Beecroft he produced six cards of Sydney views. Herbert Beecroft was born in UK and came to Australia in 1905. He was already established as a landscape and portrait painter, and soon after his arrival was painting portraits of some of Sydney's leading citizens. His postcard work was created soon after his arrival in 1905; one set of six cards of Sydney views, and another set of six titled Australian coast, but not individually titled.

This card shows the German light cruiser *Emden* after she was disabled by the Australian ship *HMAS Sydney* in 1914. The *Emden* was launced in 1908, and was based in the German East Asia Squadron, in the German concession in China. In 1914 she spent nearly two months operating in the Indian Ocean, and captured nearly two dozen ships. On 28 October 1914, *Emden* launched a surprise attack on Penang in British Malaya, where she sank the Russian cruiser *Zhemchug* and the French destroyer *Mousquet*.





we come to the work of Muriel Nicholls. David Cook, in *Picture Postcard in Australia*, gives a fair bit of background about her. Born in London, the family moved to Australia when Muriel was just a child. She studied at the Sydney Art School and became an illustrator for the *Sydney Mail* - her father was newspaper man. She exhibited her art in Sydney exhibitions, including in the Australian Exhibition of Woman's Work


